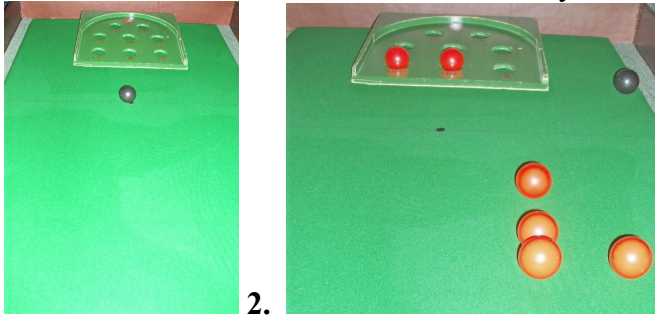


## Billiard Target Board

Balls are played onto a sloped wooden board with scoring recesses (**pic 4**). This is in the same tradition as cueing games such as la barraque and games involving the Parisian Pool board. Also similar in some ways with bagatelle.

There is one black and 6 red cue balls (**pic 2**). **Reds** score the value of the recess in which they land. **Black** scores double points. Highest score after an agreed number of rounds wins.

All cue balls must be struck from behind the marked line (**pic 3**).

A spotted black (**pic 1**) must be struck with a cue ball before any score can be made. Thereafter there are 3 ways of directing balls onto the board:-

1. The black or any other already played cue balls may be struck at directly.
2. The black or any other already played cue balls may be struck at off either cushion.
3. Cue balls may be played off either cushion (**pic 5 – cushion**).

If the opening cue ball(s) doesn't strike the black then it(they) is removed from play for that round.

If a played ball returns back down the table past the centre line then it may be played again as the next cue ball (**pic 5**).

<p><b>Format</b> 2 player singles Pairs - play alternate balls (3 balls each).</p> <p><b>Practice</b> 3 balls each.</p>	
<p><b>Dimensions</b> 8 ft x 2 ft 8" (on table supplied)</p>	<p><b>NB</b> – Equipment also used by Table Bowls 2, Table Curling, Petanque de Table, Bumper Shuffleboard</p>

### **Quick Start Guide**

6 red cue balls and one spotted black ball (counts double when potted).

An inclined ramp with numbered scoring holes.

A table with 2 side cushions.

One player plays all the balls on his turn.

Hit the black first before any score can take place.

Then, balls can be played off each other or off either cushion to score.

Balls returning more than halfway back to baulk can be played again.
